Message from the Editor

First of all I would like to WELCOME the students of 2003 batch. All the best to all of you. In my last issue I discussed about the role of DISCIPLINE in our life. Today I would like to bring you something, which is equally important for being successful. Well I am talking about the habit of "Reading books". Reading habit is something, which is very essential in order to sharpen our minds, to develop depth and breadth of knowledge and be up-to-date with what is going on all around the world.

It has been found that many students have the tendency to xerox notes rather than preparing it themselves. Either they go for 'Photocopy' or for notes prepared by others. This tendency is growing simply because in order to make notes one has to read a number of books. But unfortunately they don't understand that when one is reading to prepare his notes, at the same time he is able to widen his knowledge. One must learn for oneself. The skill of looking up a dictionary and deciphering what is right in the context, the skill of referring to Encyclopedia or other reference material and culling out the relevant matter; the skill of taking notes from that material in an organised form; the skill of interpreting and forming your own judgement of things; are some of the major skills to gain knowledge. The only instrument we have is the brain. If it is kept sharp and awake, then it can function beautifully like a good instrument and acquire knowledge persistently. So the awakening and nourishing of curiosity and the learning of several skills are essential. Don't you want to know what the books are about? A good teacher motivates the students to buy books, to read books and to make the habit of reading books. A good student wants his teacher giving books rather than giving notes. I want to see our students in Sree Book Store rather than in Sagar Xerox. Very simple equation, if you read more, you will know more, you will be able to do more for yourself and ultimately for your nation. I suggest all of our students to buy at least one book per course and to read it.

Last but not the least, I would like to appreciate our Placement Director Ms Geetika Mudali for her novel ideas like NIST Alumni Career Counselling Services (NACCS), YOGA, Saturday Night encouraging NISTians for GRE and many other valuable suggestions.

Sir, I appreciate the Student Counselling Services of your college. SIMPUTER - The PC of Masses

I am sure that you all are really hungry for some real Technological stuff so here it is(Gulp it if you---- can digest it).

Time magazine has recently selected one of the 10 technological innovations that will help the poor get richer. And yes it talks fluent Tamil, Telugu, Bengali and Marathi. Guess What? You have't yet been able to untie the mystry of what I am talking about. No it not the latest version of Pentium processor, No it is not even the revolving station of Japan. It is one of those smart machines whose technological break through is compared more powerful than that of latest Window operating system or the gleaming Titanium power Book PCs. It is not the SUPER COMPUTER OR MINICOMPUTER BUT SIMPUTER. Simputer which is known as simple, inexpensive, mobile computer will take the market from this year founded by the SIM TRUST, a collegiate of seven academics and techies founded in November 1999. SIMPUTER was designed at IISc, Bangalore.

Some of the unthinkable application area of Simputer.

- 1. The South African Government wants to develop a small ultrasound monitor and plug it to the Simputer and track fetal development in rural areas.
- 2. In Italy, they plan to link it in low cost video camera, which would use special software to convert text from, say a signboard and read it out to visually impaired users.
- 3. In Karnataka, Mr Rajiv Chawla wants to use Simputers to relieve the pain of the farmers who often suffer from corruption in recording important documents. He wants to put 20 million land records Online.

The Simputer will run on AAA batteries and its cost will be approximately Rs 10,000 to Rs 23,000. So folks, think not once but twice how can our lives change by the arrival of Simputers in the market.

'Param', the parallel super computer developed indigenously by C-DAC

Time bound projects in particular areas are implemented through separate scientific societies like Centre for Development of Advanced Computing (C-DAC) which has conceived, designed and delivered parallel super computer with peak computing power of 1 G Flops. Their second project is aimed for super computer of 100 G Flops speed.
